Rector's Ramblings

I wrote about the commemorations of the 75th anniversary of D-Day in my July Rector's Ramblings, and as Remembrance Sunday approaches I find myself thinking about them again, as well as casting my mind back to the 50th anniversary commemorations.

Back in 1994 I was a vicar in Mottingham in South East London. Henry, a member of my congregation, had been part of the crew of a Motor Torpedo Boat in operation on D-Day. His boat was sunk, and floating in the water waiting to be rescued, Henry swallowed heavy oil that stayed in his lungs for the rest of his life.

On the 50th anniversary of D-Day the Regional Council of



Normandy awarded medals to veterans who had taken part in the landings.

Henry's health meant that he was unable to make the journey to Caen to pick up his medal and asked me if I could collect it for him when I went to France for my summer holiday – which I gladly did.

At the presentation I found it very moving standing there among veterans and also people of my generation picking the medal up on behalf of family members. When the mayor pinned the medal to my chest he said *Pour votre pere? [for your father?]* I replied *Oui [yes]*, not feeling confident enough of my French to explain the whole story. But somehow I felt that my little untruth somehow conveyed a deeper truth, that I was a son of that generation and of those who had been there.

Whilst staying at Caen we made the trip to nearby Bayeux to see the tapestry. It struck me that 50 years ago an invasion force had crossed the Channel one way and that 900 years ago another invasion force had crossed the channel going the other way and that somehow, though separated by time, these events were connected to each other and that also somehow the medal had connected me to them.

I say separated by time, but in what sense does time separate us from what we call the past, or for that matter the future? We tend to think of time as a straight line, something that passes and flows like a river, as in the words of the hymn *O God our help in ages past* which we will sing again on Remembrance Sunday this month: *time like an ever rolling stream bears all its sons away*.

For Einstein, 200 years after that hymn was written, time was more like a river that speeds up and slows down as it meanders through the universe, even bending back on itself. Time has become something that scientists aren't so certain about any more. Professor Stephen Hawking, who died last year, wrote a book called *A Brief history of Time*, which along with the Bible remains one of the most bought and least read books of all time! In it he wrote this:

What is the nature of time? Will it ever come to an end? Can we go back in time? ...

Only time (whatever that may be) will tell.

And Professor Brian Cox, presenter of a number of television documentaries, said in the one he made about the nature of time:

But what is time? We might not be in a position in this moment of time with our current understanding of nature to even understand what we are asking.

Though all this may seem strange, what scientists are actually telling us is that the present is connected to the past (and to the future) in ways that we are only just beginning to comprehend. The past isn't simply borne away simply to *vanish, as a dream dies at the opening day*, as the hymn puts it. I think there's an important spiritual message there as well and it's to do with what I experienced on my trip to Caen and Bayeux. We are connected to the past, to the events and people that are part of it, in a very real way.

November is all about remembering the past. It begins with All Souls when we remember those we have loved but are no longer with us, moves through *Remember, remember the fifth of November* on to Remembrance Sunday. But remembering the past is more than not forgetting, it's remembering that all things and all people – past, present and future – are held in God's hands and remembering that ultimately, in the words that Julian of Norwich heard God say to her 600 years ago: *all will be well and all manner of things shall be well.*

OCTOBER MEETING



Remember, remember, the fifth of November... Autumn is now truly with us and at our October meeting we were ready to think about a festival that we associate with the cold, dark evenings - Bonfire Night. It is not often that we get to be addressed by a lady from the French Revolution and a gentleman Moor in armour and turban, but this is what happened at our meeting, when we were treated to a presentation by Christine Varnham and Cliff Wright, a brother and sister whose family have long been involved in the Cliffe Bonfire Society which is one of the six groups who organise the world-famous yearly processions in Lewes on 5th November. They brought with them some examples of the home made costumes which were stunning in their colour and detail. The annual bonfire parade lasts for approximately 6 hours, but the elaborate costumes and props take many hours to assemble and the participants use whatever materials will create the striking colour combinations which are needed to stand out in the torchlight procession. As an example, Cliff's fantastic Moorish hat was made from an old sports trophy, an incense burner, expanded polystyrene foam and vintage jewellery! The societies take different themes each year and costumes have included themes as varied as Vikings, Native Americans, Greek soldiers, Cavaliers and Zulus. The oldest element in the procession is the torches themselves: wooden sticks, bound in satin and wrapped in wire, they are covered in paraffin and burn for about half an hour before being replenished. Together with the rolling tar barrels, they create a dramatic effect on the night. An accompanying slide show demonstrated the long history of the Lewes event; following its Saxon settlement, this became a traditionally Protestant area where the celebration of burning Catholic effigies after the death of Guy Fawkes was embraced wholeheartedly. This reputation for standing up to authority has led to the Lewes celebration becoming notorious for the many political figures it has lampooned over the years. The dedication and enthusiasm shown by families such as Christine's and Cliff's in the bonfire societies in Lewes will no doubt ensure that this tradition is maintained for many years to come.

Last month we sent an eager team to participate in the quiz organised by the Outwood British Legion. We managed to secure sixth place out of fourteen teams and enjoyed a tasty Ploughman's supper, as well as raising funds for this worthwhile cause.

NATURE WATCH

A fter two long, hot and dry spells this summer the weather finally broke and not unexpectedly autumn blew in with a succession of Atlantic storms, one behind the other like shunting trains, lashing the coast and sweeping across the country delivering the rain that we had been so desperate for. Much of the initial heavy rainfall simply ran off the land because the ground was baked so hard and that in turn led to flooding in many parts. However, the good news was that the brown, parched lawns and fields around the village quickly became green and across the common and along footpaths a number of late season wild plants came into flower. The yellow daisy flowers of Common Fleabane and Ragwort just seemed to spring into life from the rosettes of leaves that had clung so close to the earth during the drought. There were purple thistle-like flowers of knapweed and the yellow flowers of the Prickly Sow Thistle (*Sonchus asper*). Both the smooth and prickly sow thistle are edible and the prickly version was used in traditional folk medicine as a treatment for diarrhoea. Three other late wild flowers were all very small, almost minute.

The first was Sharp Leaved Fluellen (*Kicksia elatine*) an annual found on arable land. The long stems, which are hairy and prostrate, grow from a centre point and the flowers, which are borne singly on long stalks that arise in the leaf axils, are barely 5mm across and yellow to bluish with a purple lip. Another little gem was the Lesser Spearwort (*Ranunculus flammula v reptans*), aka banewort and creeping spearwort, a member of the huge buttercup family, which has glistening yellow flowers 10mms indiameter.

It is relatively uncommon and is to be found on low lying, damp areas. Its growth is prostrate and it spreads by forming roots at leaf junctions. The last of the trio was the Dovesfoot Cranesbill (*Geranium molle*), a miniature member of yet another huge family of plants. Once again it is found on arable land and the flowers, which are 10mms across are pinkish purple in colour and appear between April and early October.

I recently met up with Penny Vaughan of Brightleigh Farm and we discussed her eco friendly approach to managing the farm. Penny said they had avoided the use of inorganic fertilizers for many years but that she wanted to pursue a more natural way of farming and a major part of her strategy was joining the Pasture for Life programme about five years ago. In essence this means using what is known as "mob grazing" for her herd of beef cattle where the cattle are given a strip of pasture to graze for a day before they are then moved forward onto a new strip. This method of grazing, which is different from the more commonly used "set stocking" where the animals are left to graze the plants right down, allows wild flowers and herbs to increase and form a much greater proportion of their nutritional intake. This has resulted in a number of benefits, the first of which has been healthier cattle resulting in a big reduction in vet fees, customers say the meat tastes a lot better and Penny said that there has been a increase in the numbers of butterflies insects and birds around the farm - a completely win-win situation. Penny has also stopped the annual cutting of field boundary hedges and is thinking about introducing trees into pastures, all of which can only bring a huge benefit to biodiversity.

OCTOBER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Surrey County Councillor Rose Thorn Tone application(s) - The Parish Council (OPC) expressed concern about the request by Highways for extra information from Tone which has not been received. Councillor (Cllr) Thorn will be following up with highways to ensure a response. The OPC are very concerned for the safety of other road users, particularly cyclist as this road is part of the Surrey Cycleway and many cyclists use it Normans Corner road markings - Concern has been raised, following an accident at this junction, that the give way road markings are frequently not visible due to the amount of mud on the road. Enforcement are looking into it. Cllr Jane Howard said the OPC would like to see more residents taking advantage of the bus service and asked if we could have a bus stop erected in Millers Lane. Cllr Thorn felt this was unlikely.

Transport – Ian Frow reported on the RACC, where the new managing director Nick Stagg was introduced. Development of the aerodrome has not gone away but has at least been put on the back burner

Tandridge District Council are experiencing serious financial difficulties

Tandridge District Councillor Kevin Bourne referred to a recent webcast of the Strategy & Resource committee.

Cllr Bourne is involved in a working group to find a way forward. Large scale projects have been put on hold.

National Trust – Reports of camping in a couple of the NT carparks. Incidents of fly-tipping.

Cllr Howard is investigating quotes and funding for the installation of a trim trail.

Lloyd Hall – current finances stand at £9,357. There are 4 or 5 weddings booked in next year. The Village Show raised a net sum of £1931. Next year's show will be on Sunday the 6th of September.

There is an ongoing problem with the cleaning contract.

St Johns church stonework repairs have been shortlisted for the King of Prussia Award.

A new **Environmental Subcommittee** of the OPC is to be set up Fiona (Fi) Mellington advised the meeting that an eco-committee has been formed with its first meeting next week.

The team had a very positive response at the Outwood Village Show. The idea is to co-ordinate some initiatives to reduce our carbon footprint. A Village meeting has been arranged on the

25th of November in the Lloyd Hall
