OUTWOOD CLIMATE CHANGE COMMITTEE - UPDATE

This month has seen a number of exciting developments. With the approval of the Outwood Parish Council, we submitted our grant application to the Rural Community Energy Fund, meeting their mid-May submission deadline. If approved – it takes six to eight weeks - the grant will pay for a feasibility study to explore renewable energy options for Outwood.

Having issued four invitations to tender for the work, three consultancies responded, and after a lengthy and objective review process, Avieco (formerly Carbon Smart who met the Parish Council and Climate Change Committee in February) were selected as the preferred supplier to carry out the study. Established in 2007, Avieco have supported hundreds of clients to 'get sustainability right' using low carbon energy generation schemes and are particularly experienced in supporting rural communities like ours.

The committee are currently investigating alternative suitable sites to locate Terracycle bins, after the Lloyd Hall was deemed unsuitable. These bins are used to recycle waste items not currently accepted through the council recycling facilities. We will keep you updated on developments.

Finally, the committee needs your help to find ways to reduce our carbon footprint and create a more sustainable and environmentally friendly community. We can't keep calling ourselves the Outwood Climate Change Committee so we want to launch a competition to find a better name for the project with a logo and a slogan or tagline to go with it. We would also love to have some entries from children and to help you all get started, here is the vision and mission that we submitted to the energy fund.

Rector's Ramblings

The month of June brings the longest day of the year, 21st June, the summer solstice. The word solstice comes from the Latin word *solstitium*, which literally means the sun standing still. From the point of view of an observer on earth, the summer solstice marks the most northerly point of the sun's annual journey through the sky, a time when the sun appears to stand still before retracing its journey in a southerly direction.



The longest day always falls near the date on which the Church celebrates the birth of John the Baptist. In my June letter last year, I wrote about the 150th anniversary celebrations we were about to have at St John the Baptist including a special service with the Bishop of Croydon. That seems a lifetime ago now. Who would have imagined back then that a year on our church buildings would be closed and all our services online? So much has changed.

Earlier this year, before everything changed, I happened to watch on television the film *The Day the Earth Stood Still*, a modern remake of the classic 1950s film. In the modern film, aliens arrive on Earth to save the planet, which initially seems a good thing until people realise that the aliens have come to save Earth from humankind. The aliens know that the Earth is too precious and rare a thing in the universe to allow humans to destroy it, so to preserve the earth they plan to destroy humanity – it's a kind of modern take on the biblical story of Noah's ark and the flood. In the end, because one of the aliens experiences the preciousness of human love and kindness, they all relent and humanity survives. But as the aliens leave, they shut down all electrical and mechanical activity – the earth stands still. The question 'How long for?' is left hanging in the air. Watching the film really made me pause and think.

And then the earth did stand still for us all. Not literally, just as the sun does not literally stand still at the solstice, but in so many ways so much of life as we have been used to living it did stop and not just in this country but right across the world.

Going back to John the Baptist, he is the forerunner of Jesus and the celebration of John's birth comes six months before the celebration Christ's birth. In Matthew's Gospel we read how the star lead the wise men to Bethlehem until it 'stood still' over the place where Jesus was born.

Just like the sun, a star could not literally stand still, but the meaning behind those words doesn't need a literal understanding to be meaningful. There is an ancient Christian tradition that at the moment of Jesus's birth everything stood still – for a moment nothing moved and creation held its breath. And out of that stillness God came into the world.

And what will come out of our enforced stillness this time round? I wrote last month how I had begun to see people and things, including our natural world, in a fresh way. As I write this letter I have in front of me a newspaper article reporting a survey which reveals that two thirds of Britons believe we will emerge from this crisis as kinder people.

And kinder people is what we all should be because it is who we are. To be human is to be part of humankind. The word kind has the same root as the word kin. Our next of kin is our next of kind. To be kind nowadays means to be caring and loving. But it comes from the idea that we treat our next of kind in a kindly, loving way. We may not have been visited by aliens but we have been visited by something else unknown. Wouldn't it be lovely if, in the midst of all the sadness and suffering COVID-19 has brought, it also taught us what it means to be kind.


CHURCH SERVICES ONLINE AND ON CD

QUIET OUTWOOD?

Unbelievably it is nearly four years since Route 4 was moved over us and blighted most of our lives with an enormous increase in aircraft noise. This was a move that was subsequently declared unlawful following a Judicial Review pursued by Plane Justice and supported by Quiet Outwood. We are delighted to report that the final CAA decision has now confirmed that the current route, implemented in May 2016, has failed in it's replication of the route that was in place at the time.

In short, according to the CAA directions given in the final decision report, the route will therefore revert to the old route that was being flown in 2012, at the latest by 9th October 2020. For the sake of clarity, Route 4 will return later this year to the route flown before the changes that occurred towards the end of 2013.

Given current circumstances, we appreciate that this result may appear a little 'hollow' in light of the difficult and challenging circumstances we all face but felt it was important to advise this news especially for those of us who have unjustly suffered this route since its invidious move in 2016 and hope that it can at least be seen as something positive in these dark times.

To have reached this point is a culmination of considerable effort and determination and our particular thanks should be given to Chris Quinlan and his colleagues at Plane Justice whose total belief in the injustice of the unlawful route move in 2016 has resulted in this final decision. We'd also like to thank those villagers who continued to support 'the cause' with their own financial contributions to the legal battle and/or took the time to register aircraft noise disturbances on an almost daily basis – all of which helped achieve this tremendous result.

Please stay safe and enjoy the beautiful village and countryside that we are so fortunate to be part of.

BE SCAM AWARE

(Advice from Surrey County Council)

Not everyone is trustworthy and some people will take advantage of this unusual situation. Be aware of:

- People offering miracle cures or vaccines for coronavirus.
- People impersonating healthcare workers, claiming to be offering 'home-testing' for coronavirus.
- E-mails saying you can get a refund on taxes, utilities or similar are usually bogus they are just after your personal and bank details.
- Fake products saying they can protect you or cure coronavirus.
- Mobile phone applications which claim to give you updates on the virus, but instead, they lock your phone and demand a ransom.
- People offering to do your shopping or collecting medication and asking for money upfront and then disappearing.

Tips to avoid being scammed:

- Be cautious and listen to your instincts. Don't be afraid to hang up, bin it, delete it or shut the door.
- Always ask for ID.
- Be aware of fake news and use trusted sources such as gov.uk or NHS.uk websites.
- Protect your financial information, especially from people you don't know. Never give your bank card or pin number to a stranger.

NATURE WATCH

When tha's a rook, tha's a crow And when tha's crows, tha's rooks.

This old East Anglian adage neatly sums up the difference between two of our most populous and widespread birds and is quoted by Mark Cocker in his excellent book Crow Country. Both birds are members of the corvid family of which there are five other species in Great Britain including, the raven, jay, magpie, jackdaw and chough. Five of these species are to be seen regularly around the village but it is the crow and rook that are often difficult to tell apart. Crows are 10 - 20% heavier than rooks, with bare legs, whereas adult rooks have feathered legs and a very large beak, which is emphasised by the grey coloured patch of warty skin at the top, and their feathers are very iridescent so the wings often flash silver in the sunshine. However, the main difference is that crows, who pair for life, are usually seen singularly or in pairs, except in the early part of the year when they can be in family groups of three or four, whereas rooks, who also form monogamous relationships, are extremely gregarious and are always seen in flocks often accompanied by jackdaws. These flocks can contain many thousands of birds.

The rook (*Corvus frigilegus*) is a lowland bird and from south of the Scottish Highlands it is common throughout Britain. On average it is 45cms in length and weighs roughly 450gms. Their call is rather coarse and can best be described as a Craa. It is just so recognisable that together with the bark of a fox or the hoot of an owl it has become an audible shorthand for anything rural - if you hear it you know you are in the countryside.



An interesting aside is that the word rook for the chess piece, sometimes called a castle, does not refer to the bird but is taken from a Persian word meaning a war chariot. Rooks lay between 3 and five greenish coloured eggs, which hatch asynchronously like a few other birds such as owls, which ensures the first egg hatches before the second and the chick can build strength so that at least one chick survives. Rooks like other corvids are intelligent and have been referred to as Britain's brainiest bird. They use their wits to outsmart competitors by hiding their food or caching it for future use. They have a wide taste in food that includes worms and other invertebrates, berries, fruit, small animals such as voles and chicks and their feeding areas can be up to ten kilometres from the roost site. The roost site, and the rookery, which is where they nest and breed, are in different places often some distance apart and the flight lines have been recorded as being in existence for up to hundreds of years. Rookeries are usually in high trees and are the home of the colony, which like the flight lines go back many years. The birds generally make new nests each year using twigs and other material from the old nests.

The warm sunny weather that has run alongside the virus lockdown, has given us a good showing of butterflies, which in the last few weeks have included small whites, dainty holly blues, speckled woods and the emergence of large number of small heaths in mid May. Reports have included one from a delighted Laura Ient who saw her first skylark and Mary Baldock who spotted five moorhen chicks on the pond behind the church.

MAY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Election of Officers: Cllr Howard was elected Chair and Cllr Wyer was elected Vice-chair of the Parish Council

Tandridge District Council Report:

Cllr Fitzgerald reported that heavy goods vehicles emptying into a field opposite the Dog and Duck and that the Public Byway had been closed. He will make further enquiries about what development is taking place at this site and whether the byway closure is official

Planning: HGV licence application for a site at the bottom of Rookery Hill – we have objected on the grounds of a dangerous exit and the impact on a bridle path that runs through the site.

Climate Change Committee: A grant application to fund a feasibility study has been completed and the Parish Council voted to submit the application.

MUGA and wells field: Quotes are being obtained for grass cutting. The MUGA has been re-opened for use by family groups or two people who should adhere to current social distancing rules.

Community Matters: Earlswood tip has re-opened for black sack waste and garden. The Council are exploring options for placing a defibrillator at the Dog and Duck Pub

Neighbourhood watch: A new coordinator has not yet been found

Dealing with vulnerable neighbours:

A list of households who may need support during the lockdown has been drawn up and the Parish Council will make contact with them after suitable safeguarding training. There is a grant available for Parish Councils that they can use to help residents in financial difficulty. Further enquiries will be made to see if we can access this fund.
